HYMN #167—"How Lovely Shines the Morning Star"

The hymn is one of the monuments of Lutheran hymns and is called the Queen of Chorales. (A "chorale" is a non-Latin Lutheran hymn written between 1520 and 1750.)

It was used so extensively at weddings, that the idea really became common that if this hymn were not sung at the wedding, the persons were not properly married. Stanzas of the hymn were engraved upon bowls and kettles and vases. It was sung at Communion because of the fourth stanza and because the lines form the shape of the chalice when centered in printing. It was used at the deathbed of Christians who had kept the pure faith in love for the Savior of their souls, and who were prepared to follow the invitation to the great supper of the Lamb, the wedding feast in the Kingdom of God. The theologian Johann Gerhard died while singing the words of the seventh stanza.

The author, a pastor named Philipp Nicolai, labeled the hymn, "A spiritual bridal song of the believing soul concerning Jesus Christ, her heavenly bridegroom, founded on the 45th Psalm of the prophet David." The Morning Star in the very first line is Jesus according to Revelation 22:16.

Nicolai wrote both the text and tune in 1597 while the Black Death pandemic raged in his town, killing 1,400 people. He published a short hymnal in 1599 and in the preface wrote, "To leave behind me (if God should call me from this world) as a token of my peaceful, joyful, Christian departure, or (if God should spare me in health) to comfort other sufferers whom He should also visit with the pestilence." This hymn was one of three printed in this booklet. One of the others is today called the King of Chorales, the hymn "Wake, Awake, for Night Is Flying" (Hymn #544 in our *Evangelical Lutheran Hymnary*).





Advent is a season of preparation, and is therefore a penitential season, or a season of repentance. A Litany, or prayer list, is a traditional portion of penitential worship, quiding our eyes constantly to the God who provides us all we need. We come before God with all these petitions and know that he promises to hear us, and he will give us his blessings through the Word and Sacraments in the Divine Service.

The Collect is a brief prayer that "collects" in one short petition all that we are asking God to do for us, based on the specific section of his Word which is preached on that day.



The Epistle lesson indicates that the Old Testament is fulfilled in Christ, and we now live in the age of that fulfillment.

The Gospel calls us to rely on God's mercy in Christ, which then motivates us to love as we have been loved. The context of this epistle assures us that God declares us righteous, not because of our ability to love, but solely because of Christ, who is the end of the Law.

God promises to answer prayer, but we may be impatient or tempted to question his answers. Even when our faithfulness fails, God is faithful. He hears our prayers and truly acts for our good. In faith, we patiently wait for him.

This is one of the oldest hymns in the hymn book. Attributed to Ambrose (b. 340), it is a prayer Christ would come today. This is not a vain hope as Christ has come from the Father in heaven. The second stanza sings it this way "Not by human flesh and blood, By the Spirit of our God, Was the Word of God made flesh Woman's Offspring, pure and fresh."

The Sanctus begins with the threefold song that Isaiah heard the angels sing in his vision of heaven (Isaiah 6). Here time and space truly end for a moment and we participate in the joys of the heavenly feast. The second half of the Sanctus is the song of Palm Sunday: "Hosanna!" which "Save means, US, please!" As certain as the Lord came into Jerusalem on that first Palm Sunday to accomplish salvation, now he comes into our midst to give us the blessings of that salvation in his body and his blood.

We stand out of eagerness for the Gospel and reverence for this holiest treasure, acknowledging that our Lord is indeed present in his Gospel. Here we find Jesus revealed as the answer to all our prayers and praises.

Palm Sunday is a high point, as a crowd at the Jewish capital openly acclaims Jesus as Messiah. It is also a turning point, however, since it galvanizes his opponents. Like the crowds in Jerusalem, we are prone to ficklenesstoday, all for the Lord! tomorrow, turning from him. Though we often prove faithless, Jesus remains constant. His love and forgiveness never falter.

2 Corinthians 4:13—
"Since we have the same spirit of faith according to what has been written, 'I believed, and so I spoke,' we also believe, and so we also speak."

This hymn was written by Orthodox Lutheran pastor Paul Gerhardt around 1640, during the Thirty Years' War. This pastor was beset by difficulty throughout his life, and yet he still took comfort in the Gospel of our Lord's The hymn coming. beautifully preaches to our souls what Jesus has come to do for us: notice how Jesus' extreme love is depicted, his comfort for us in the forgiveness of sins and salvation, and the reason we need fear nothina.

In response to the gifts of God in his Word, we give him our thanks in praise, in song, in prayer, and in portions of our material blessings.

14. The Proper Preface

P: It is truly good, right, and salutary that we should at all times and in all places give thanks to You, holy Lord, almighty Father, everlasting God; through Jesus Christ our Lord, whose way John the Baptist prepared, proclaiming Him the Messiah, the very Lamb of God, and calling sinners to repentance that they might escape from the wrath to be revealed when He comes again in glory. Therefore with angels and archangels and all the company of heaven we laud and magnify Your glorious name, evermore praising You and saying:



With this three-part song-and-response, we are joined as the body of Christ, setting the mood for the celebration of the Lord's Supper.

2 Timothy 4:22 Lamentations 3:41 Psalm 92:1

The pastor assures the communicants what they intend and promise to do (sing to their Lord in thanks and praise) is not only the right thing to do, but is also wholesome for body, soul, mind, and spirit (salutary). The Proper Preface ends by showing us how we are united with the saints and angels in unending praise. Here we are closest to our brothers and sisters who have gone before us. They are gathered at the Feast of the Lamb on that side of heaven, and we are gathered at his Table on this side of heaven, all one in the Lord.
